... the rain storms this spring have brought out an amazing number of Sweet Peas to the slope on La Novia. We didn't plant new seeds this winter as there was such a poor showing last year. I'm sure some of these are from our seeds. And many of them are "Be Backs" — as I lovingly refer to them — seeds that were planted by Mother Nature from past plantings that were dropped when the pods dried out.

There are a large number of recurring flowers that have been naturalized over the years. They are the reddish-purple blossoms. Newer plants have the

pink or white and red blossom mixed. I have noticed plants blooming on the north slope too. Lavender sweet peas are mixed in with the native Statis blooms. Since they are both purple, it makes them a little harder to spot.

It's okay to pick them if you're sure-footed. Bring scissors so that you get just the blossom's stem and not the entire plant. My kids cut a couple of handfuls for small bouquets so that we can have that sweet glorious smell in the house. If your nose is good, you can roll down the window in your car and catch a bit of a whiff as you drive by.
