Leave the Leaves

We spend hours bagging leaves like they're garbage, but those same leaves are nature's fertilizer factory. All the nutrients a tree pulled from the soil during the growing season get stored in its leaves. When they fall and decompose, that nutrition cycles right back where it belongs.

By removing them, we're robbing the soil of its food supply only to turn around and replace it with store-bought fertilizer packaged in plastic. It's like throwing away a home-cooked meal just to order takeout.

Want to work with nature instead of against it? 🍂

- ✨ Shred leaves with your mower and let them feed your meadow or lawn.
- ✨ Rake them around garden beds for insulation and weed control.
- ✨ Use them to build leaf mold or add them to your compost pile.
- ✨ Leave them alone and create an overwintering habitat for bees, butterflies and bugs.

What may look like a mess is actually one of the smartest systems nature designed. All we have to do is let it work.

Fire Watch

Orange County Fire Watch Gears Up for Southern California's Fire Season



Orange County Fire Watch volunteers participate in a mock deployment in Ridge Park, Crystal Cove.

Wildfires are among the most destructive events that can occur in urban wildlands and pose a serious threat to nearby communities. In preparation for Southern California's peak fire season, Orange County Fire Watch volunteers recently conducted a mock deployment to practice their response protocols.

During Red Flag Warning events, volunteers and partner agency staff are deployed to high-risk areas. Practicing these exercises during mock deployments simulates real wildfire conditions, ensuring volunteers are prepared to act swiftly and effectively...

Spraying herbicides in bloom season kills more than plants. It kills every insect that depends on those blooms. Throw out the Roundup!

The U.S. has lost over 3 billion birds since 1970. One reason? The insects they eat are disappearing from pesticide use. Stop spraying and watch the birds return.

Lawns are like the beige carpeting of the outdoors. Bland, high-maintenance, and utterly useless for anything except looking “acceptable” to the HOA.

Meanwhile, native plants are basically nature’s VIP section. They’ve been here longer than your house, they know how to survive without constant babysitting, and they throw the best parties. Bees, butterflies, birds, the occasional frog!! Everyone’s invited.

When you swap out that thirsty patch of grass for natives, you’re not just cutting your water bill, you’re creating wildfire buffers, restoring soil health, and giving pollinators the all-you-can-eat buffet they deserve. You’re putting out a welcome mat for biodiversity and telling invasive species “Sorry, this club’s guest list is full.” And the best part? Once those deep-rooted natives settle in, you can spend less time mowing and more time just existing in a thriving, self-sustaining ecosystem you helped create.

Rewilding isn’t about letting things go, it’s about giving the land a chance to remember what it’s been doing for thousands of years... before humans decided every front yard needed to look like a golf course. *Paul Avellino*

BEE WISE

Hybridization of plants has resulted in the decrease of pollen in some species.

Rule of Thumb—“shop with the butterflies and bees”. If they are enjoying the plant, it is probably because there is plenty of pollen. If the butterflies and bees are avoiding the plant, no matter how colorful, it is probably because there is little or no pollen.

I am currently sitting here in awe watching the many bumblebees in my garden. This is an exponential increase—last year I was aware of only one. This year my garden has been blessed with several of these wonderful creatures. They are so darn cheerful.....going about their seemingly carefree lives. Are you experiencing more bumblebees in your garden?

Fun factoid: one of their “tribe” names is Bombini!!!! (how cute is that?) **Another fun factoid: contrary to popular urban myth – bumblebees can sting!** They just usually don't - being much more interesting foraging.

Just like honeybees, they are vital to plant pollination (especially food crops) and, just like honeybees, they are tottering on extinction due to habitat destruction and excessively high pesticide use. STOP SPRAYING, PEOPLE!

I am not sure what exactly I am doing right this year. They seem to favor the bright yellow flowers of the Popcorn Cassia and the purple flowers of the Sea Lavender and the Moss Rose. I think I should add some Cone Flowers.
